

## ***Privilege for SALE!***

***Each privilege costs \$100. Decide which privileges you will be buying with the money you're allotted.***

- 1- You can easily find role models and mentors to emulate who share your identity.
- 2- Having positive and accurate media images of people with whom you can identify.
- 3- Working in a job dominated by people of your gender, but not feeling as though you are a representative/spokesperson for your sexuality.
- 4- Going wherever you wish knowing that you will not be harassed, beaten, or killed.
- 5- Being able to be promoted in your job without your age, gender, race, etc. playing a factor.
- 6- You can tick a box on a form without someone disagreeing and telling you not to lie.
- 7- Being open and having your partner(s) accepted by your family.
- 8- You can reasonably assume that you will not be denied services at a hospital, bank, or other institution because the staff does not believe the gender marker on your ID card to match your gender identity.
- 9- Being employed as a preschool or elementary school teacher without people assuming you will "corrupt" the children.
- 10- You can use public restrooms without fear of verbal abuse, physical intimidation, or arrest.
- 11- Being able to access social services without fear of discrimination, or being turned away.
- 12- Expecting that your children will be given texts in school that support and reflect your family.
- 13- Receiving validation from your religious community.
- 14- Being accepted by your neighbors, colleagues, and new friends.
- 15- You can access gender-exclusive spaces (e.g., a space or activity for women), and not be excluded.
- 16- Having multiple positive TV role models.
- 17- Knowing that your basic civil rights will not be denied or outlawed because some people disapprove of your lifestyle.
- 18- Expressing affection in most social situations and not expecting hostile or violent reactions from others.
- 19- Expecting to be around individuals who are like you most of the time. Not worrying about being the only one of your sexuality, race, gender, etc. in a class, on a job, or in a social situation.
- 20- Being able to feel safe in your interactions with police officers nor victimized by the criminal justice system.
- 21- You can walk through the world and generally blend in, not being constantly stared or gawked at, whispered about, pointed at, or laughed at.
- 22- Being able to live anywhere in the world and find people like yourself.
- 23- Strangers call you by the name you provide and don't ask what your "real name" (birth name) is and then assume that they have a right to call you by that name.
- 24- Raising children without worrying about people rejecting them.
- 25- Hollywood accurately depicts individuals like you in films and television, without tokenizing your identity as the focus of a dramatic storyline or the punchline of a joke.
- 26- Acting, dressing, or talking as you choose without it being a reflection on people of your age, race, gender, sexuality, etc.
- 27- Talking openly about your relationship, vacations, and family planning you and your lover/partner are doing.
- 28- Knowing that being open with your sexuality isn't going to change how people view you.
- 29- You are not required to undergo an extensive psychological evaluation in order to receive basic medical care.
- 30- Inheriting from your partner(s)/lover(s)/companion(s) automatically after their death.
